Those who are caregivers and those whose care they manage are likely to face four areas of suffering: Fearfulness, Helplessness, Meaninglessness, Hopelessness. (*Where IS God When It Hurts*, Philip Yancey)

Why Have a Caregiver Ministry?

PEOPLE

A. According to a 2015 Report of the *World Health Organization* around 15% of the world's population, over a billion people depend on the attention provided by a caregiver.

SERVICE

B. Those with special needs represent the world's largest minority group and highlight the need for caregiving.

COMMUNITY

C. The caregiver knows that persons with disabilities are more likely to be victims of violence or rape, according to a British

study, and less likely to obtain police intervention, legal protection, or preventative care.

Four Frontiers of Suffering

FEARFULNESS

- 1. An overwhelming sense of aloneness and feeling abandoned by God and by others may be experienced.
- 2. Loneliness increases the fear, which in turn increases the pain and downward the spiral goes.
- 3. Fear prevents us from seeing things accurately.

HELPLESSNESS

- 4. I prayed, I thought, to a silent darkness and the most painful part of it was the seeming silence of God (*p. 201*).
- 5. The key is hidden in the questions we ask when we suffer.
 - Why must I endure this uncertainty?
 - Will I ever be happy again?
 - How is this fitting together for my good?

MEANINGLESSNESS

 "It is not so much the suffering as the senselessness of it that is unendurable" Friedrich Neitzshe.

- 7. "Suffering can be what economists call a "frozen asset". It may not look remotely like an asset at the time, but gradually we can find meaning in it, an enduring meaning that will help to transform the pain" (*p. 205*).
- 8. "Sometimes the only meaning we can offer a suffering person is the assurance that their suffering, which has no apparent meaning for them, has meaning for us" (*p.207*).

HOPELESSNESS

- And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us" (Romans 5:5).
- 10. Hope is more than optimism. Hope means simply the belief that something good lies ahead. It is not the same as optimism or wishful thinking, for these imply a denial of reality (*p. 204*).
